
BUSKETT WOODLAND HOSTS ANOTHER MEMORABLE ETWINNING 20TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION



eTwinning Job Shadowing in Estonia:

A Snapshot of International Collaboration

From April 28–30, 2025, NSO representatives from Estonia, Malta, Spain, and Turkey gathered at the Harno office in Tallinn for a dynamic eTwinning Job Shadowing Programme. The event focused on sharing best practices, strengthening partnerships, and exploring new ways to promote eTwinning across diverse educational contexts.

The first day featured introductions and strategic discussions on ambassador programmes, communications planning, and Erasmus+synergies. Delegates exchanged ideas on using social media, newsletters, and national networks to amplify eTwinning's reach.

On the second day, participants visited Tallinn Kindergarten Pääsusilm to learn about Estonia's innovative early education system. The school showcased outdoor learning, physical activity, and the use of digital tools with young children. Back at Harno, sessions focused on expanding eTwinning in VET, rural, and special needs education, as well as outreach to arts and language schools.

The programme concluded with sessions on developing eTwinning Schools and measuring impact. A key outcome was the formation of a new NSO support network, marking the start of ongoing collaboration across borders. The event reflected the spirit of European cooperation and innovation in education.





Little Inventors at Work with Their Inventions

During this scholastic year, Ms
Elaine Gauci from Dingli Primary
School collaborated with partners
from Turkey, Greece, Poland, and
Romania on the project Little
Inventors at Work with Their
Inventions. The students had
the opportunity to learn about
various inventors whose ideas
have helped shape our world.

They explored inventors linked to different fields, such as space and communication—learning about figures like Neil Armstrong and Alexander Graham Bell, who revolutionised the way we connect with one another. In the area of transport, they discovered the Wright brothers, pioneers behind the concept of powered flight.

Pupils were encouraged to research and study any inventor of their choice. We were particularly curious about crayons and found that Edwin Binney was the creative mind behind developing safe and colourful tools for artistic expression.

The students proudly shared

what they had learnt with the rest of the school during a special assembly. They spoke about 11 inspiring inventors who believed in their ideas and made a difference

This STEM-focused project allowed children to observe the evolution of inventions from the past to the present. A variety of experiments took place in the classroom, enhancing students' critical and creative thinking skills. It also fostered a sense of teamwork and belonging through collaborative experiments, games, and interactive activities.

In addition to scientific exploration, students also engaged in art and craft activities, developing manual abilities, hand-eye coordination, observational skills, and aesthetic awareness.

Throughout this project, Game-Based Learning, Project-Based Learning, and Discovery Learning approaches were integrated, supporting a cross-curricular educational experience.

ETWINING SCHOOL LABEL AWARDS 2025-2026 CELEBRATION

The eTwinning School Label Awards 2025–2026 were celebrated on 12th June 2025 at The Notch Conference Centre, Urban Valley Resort, Kappara. The event was organised to honour 20 Maltese schools that were recognised at European level for their commitment to the core values of eTwinning.

The awards acknowledged achievements in shared leadership, collaboration and teamwork, student agency, inclusion and innovation, and for being role models for other schools across Europe.

During the celebration, good practices were shared by students, heads of schools, and educators, showcasing the collaborative spirit and innovative approaches implemented in their learning communities.

The dedication of teachers and school leaders was praised, and Malta was highlighted as one of the countries with the highest number of awarded eTwinning Schools per capita. The event concluded with a reception by the pool.
